Christmas is a special time of year for children all over the world. A time for joy, excitement, and wonder. And for children who are hurting and in pain, a time to hope for better things to come.



Bombai came to the Orphanage a few years ago. At first he was sad and withdrawn, like many children when they arrive. In a short period of time, Bombai blossomed. In April 2006, when Bombai was six-years-old, he was adopted by a single woman in Mexico. Preparing for Bomai to leave was very bittersweet at El Sauzal. The staff and visitors who knew him were happy for his new life, but sad to lose such a wonderful child.

Then, quietly, in the late summer of 2006, Bombai was returned to El Sauzal. His adoptive mom did not feel that she could care for him. We were overjoyed at his return, but Bombai was hurt. Nanny Betty told me how Bombai spent some months sad and withdrawn. Then very slowly he opened up again. This photo was taken of him last Christmas.

When you help El Sauzal, you help bring hope and joy to kids like Bombai. A hope that there are better things to come.


Here, elementary school teacher Bill Yu from Canada shares his experiences with a few special El Sauzal kids.

She may not even remember me next year, and doesn't realize the impact she's made on my heart, but for her, Abel, Jesus/Bombai, and so many of the other children, I can't wait to go back next year and see what else I can do to be a blessing in their lives, although I know that they'll end up blessing me more!

You gave \$12,800 to purchase a van. We recently found and purchased our new vehicle, a 2000 Chevrolet 15-passenger van. It cost \$11,300, which left funds for the importation expenses into Mexico. You responded to the back to school plea with \$3,100. Thank you! That was enough to cover

the uniform costs of our children at the beginning of this school year.
